Stop at Watson's Chocolate - 738 Elmwood - and after tasting this Buffalo inspired candy, you will want to take some home with you!!

Elmwood Village is a vibrant busy area. You will have a wonderful time checking out the shops, having lunch or just people watching. Keep walking to Bidwell on Saturday afternoon and pick up fresh fruit/veggies at the Farmer's Market to enjoy in your hotel room.

Stop at the Founding Fathers Pub at 75 Edward Street, on your trip back to the Hyatt, for a beer/glass of wine. Check out the artifacts regarding various U.S. presidents. Looking for a nice dinner before the activities begin at 7pm, stop at the Dinosaur Barbecue.
