(If employed, a letter from the appropriate supervisor indicating the nominee will be allowed the required time off will be required. If leave is not allowed, but use of vacation leave is approved, the nominee(s) should include with the nomination a statement they will use such leave to attend meetings.);

1st Annual IAWP Battle of the Units: Project Food Cans

The Inland Empire Local Chapter decided they would have a Veterans food drive. They decided to have a "battle" between each of the individual units in the Riverside UI office. The Riverside UI office has 13 different units and each was challenged to see which unit brought in the most food items. The winning unit would get a free pizza party.

The chapter purchased enough boxes for each unit of the offices and a flyer was created.

One box was placed at each of



the manager's cubicles. The boxes were purchased at The Home Depot. The event started November 1, 2016, and ended on November 15, 2016. It was anticipated that there would be a good participation, since the Riverside office has some 10 Veterans with one a Purple Heart recipient.

By the end of the first week, we knew we had a problem. The boxes in some of the units became full and started to overflow. Empty copier paper boxes were utilized by those units that needed them to absorb the overflow. The word got around about how one unit was doing versus another and how the individual staff members needed to step it up. Even our Office Manager Agustin Huerta was caught in the action and dropped off a donation.

Monday was a final push with large quantities of donations coming in. Tuesday was the cutoff and the IE President Roderick Shackelford and the Treasurer Peter Gallerani counted the contents of each of the boxes.

We decided to use one of our conference rooms and spread the contents out for a picture opportunity. The ordeal was more than they thought it would be, but the more they unpacked the contents on the table the more excited they became. It kept growing until they had emptied 16 boxes of goods or 1,136 food items (See picture). It blew us all away as to the generosity of our members and nonmembers.

The winning unit was from manager Lilia Betancourt with 11 staff members. They donated 283 food items. The donated goods were delivered to the Disabled American Veterans located at 4351 University Ave, Riverside, CA 92501.

As a veteran, Ray could not be more proud of the heart felt contribution the Riverside Unemployment Insurance Center made towards this outstanding effort. This will help veterans and military families have a better Thanksgiving Holiday. The Riverside office effort has produced a wave of inquiries as to our program and the desire to have our concept reproduced in their offices. Copies have been sent to each interested office.

James "Jimmy" Walker Jackson, was born January 2, 1935, into the family of Roscoe Tyrel Jackson and Beulah Thomas Jackson. Jimmy 81, passed away at his home on December 6, 2016. Jimmy grew up in Houston's Fifth Ward, where he attended Wheatley High School, graduating in 1955. After high school, he attended college in Newport News, Virginia. In 1955, he married Joyce Evelyn Gavion and from this union, three children were born. Later in life, Jimmy married Shirley Davis. And, in his later years, Phadra Glen was his special companion.

After college, he began working for the Texas Employment Commission in Houston and later transferred to the Administrative Office in Austin. He worked for 33 years, finishing his career as Director of Unemployment Insurance. Jimmy was an active member and officer of his professional association, the International Association of Personnel in Employment Security, later International Association of Workforce Professionals.

He served in all Texas Chapter offices and in several capacities on the International Board. He was International President in 1987, when Texas hosted the International Conference in San Antonio.


As UI Director, Jimmy focused on getting UI employees actively involved in IAPES and getting IAPES more involved in UI area. He would often say, "UI needs love too." He was also known for his comment about IAPES members at professional conferences. He often said, "We work hard and we play hard. We may be up late at night, but we will always be at the meeting the next morning on time."

Jimmy was an active member of Lighthouse Missionary Baptist Church. He was an avid fan of the Texans and a season pass holder. Jimmy always believed in them and always said, next year, next year. He loved golf, so much so that he made his own clubs and the clubs for his children.

Jimmy is preceded in death by his parents Roscoe and Beulah Jackson, his sisters Ruby Crawford and Willie Mae White, his brother Henry Jackson, and daughter Regina (Reginald) Holcombe.

Jimmy, or Pop as he was called by his family, is survived by his sister Betty Hester, sons Kenneth (Denise) and Michael (Talawney); 6 grandchildren, 11 great-grandchildren, many loving nieces and nephews, and numerous other relatives and friends.

Co-worker and Past Texas Chapter President Lana Duerksen summed it up well when she said, "Jimmy was one of the good guys. He cared about our clients and the workers that served them. I remember Jimmy said if in doubt on a UI claim – pay it. No child should be hungry or parent be where they can't provide. His compassion was without bounds. He stood with me when Quality Control was dissolved and made sure I still had a job back in the Tax Department. I appreciated it and him for his willingness to keep as many jobs as was possible within the agency."



Past International President Diana Staley wrote, "Jimmy was a fine gentleman and I was honored to call him my friend. His memory will always be special."

A series of study guides and tests to increase your knowledge about the workforce development system. There are 4 modules and tests for each module.

Modules:

- History of Workforce Development (Units 1-4)
- Unemployment Insurance (Units 1-4)
- Labor Market Information (Units 1-4)
- Business and Job Seeker (Units 1-4)

Tests:

- 25 multiple-choice questions
- 75% correct answers to pass (19 out of 25)
- Tests are online and available anywhere an Internet connection is available

Costs:

\$10 for each unit (includes study guide and exam)

Timeframes:

- 36 months to complete each module
- Once you complete all the WPDP units you will receive a WPDP Master designation and are qualified to apply for certification as an IAWP Certified Workforce Specialist (CWS).

CERTIFIED WORKFORCE SPECIALIST (CWS)

The Certified Workforce Specialist (CWS) credential after your name shows you are part of an outstanding group of workforce professionals who have extensive knowledge and experience in workforce issues. It shows you have passed a rigorous competency-based testing program from an international association, that you are respected by your peers, and that you see professional membership as an important part of your career. The CWS designation shows current and potential employers your initiative in developing, maintaining, and improving your career skills within the workforce field. There are 4 certification requirements:

- Education plus Experience
- Professional Membership
- IAWP Workforce Professional Development Program (WPDP) completion
- Professional References

The certification is valid for 3 years and can be renewed with additional education.
